



Course Objectives

Population:

- Generally, 90% of the population will have little trouble with recovery.
- 10% or less will require significant assistance.
- The elderly, low income renters, the disadvantaged, and families that survive on two or three jobs have substantial difficulties during recovery.





Schools:

- Schools sometimes underestimate the significant role they play in recovery.
- They serve as shelters, sources of community gathering and are often the only place to rally people.
- Every priority should be given to reopening schools as soon as possible.





Regulations

 Environmental laws and regulations must be adhered to during disaster.

• Costs:

 Nothing can be built for what is costs ten years ago. Billion dollar disasters are now common.

• Economy:

 An urgent need is to stabilize the local economy within a community.






- Subsequent Emergencies:
 - The focus on disaster recovery is on people and property.
 - Many other cascading disasters can occur within an incident that need to be dealt with.
- Japan as an example:
 - Earthquake.
 - Tsunami.
 - Radioactive emergency.
 - Food and water contamination.







- Disposal of Debris:
 - Dealing with millions of tons of different types of debris.
- Sewer Systems:
 - Both public and private.
- Water:
 - Pollution of drinking water caused by loss of power, flooding or broken lines.
- Taxes.
 - All government disaster relief is funded by taxes.





The Purpose of ESF 14







Purpose of ESF 14

 ESF 14 provides the framework for coordinating federal, state and local disaster recovery activities.

 Identifies and facilitates the availability and use of recovery funding and technical assistance for long term recovery activities.






When is ESF 14 Activated?

 At the federal level it may be activated for incidents requiring a coordinated Federal response to housing, agriculture, business, employment, infrastructure etc...

 At the local government level it may be activated to meet requirements of many scenarios, especially infrastructure and housing.







• DHS/FEMA is ESF Coordinator.

 Departments of Agriculture, Homeland Security, Housing & Urban development, and the SBA are primary agencies.

 Activities are coordinated with state and local governments through the JFO.




Coordination At Local Government Level



This depends on the size and budget of the jurisdiction.


 Normally, emergency management offices coordinate ESF 14 activities on a local level.


 Damage assessment is the basis for ESF 14 planning and operations.





The Recovery Task Force








The Recovery Task Force


- The RTF is established to oversee the recovery and reconstruction process.
- It is made up of a broad range of individuals.
- It serves in an advisory capacity.
- The RTF meets after the damage assessment has been completed and emergency response is over.
- Management of the RTF may be assigned to planning, DPW, OHSEP, or leadership.






RTF Responsibilities


- Review damage reports.
- Confirm action items by department or agency.
- Evaluate damaged public facilities for COG –
 COOP purposes.
- The RTF may have a Disaster Recovery Coordinator, a Hazard Mitigation Coordinator, and an Economic Recovery Coordinator.




 Create a matrix similar to the following one based on your jurisdiction.

 Align departments and agencies with the skill sets needed to address a particular problem or to provide a service.








